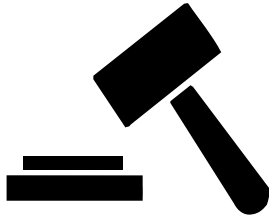

March 1—John Baker, BS, MBA, JD, Beginning Farmer Center, Iowa State University

Baker is the Staff Attorney for the Iowa Concern Hotline. He created the Farm On Project, and is founder and current president of International Farm Transition Network. He also drafted legislation creating Beginning Farmer Center and is currently its chief administrator.

He has given numerous talks throughout the US, and in England, Japan and Canada on business succession planning.

March 9 and March 11—Terry Knoepfle, JD, CPA, Assoc. Professor, NDSU

Knoepfle's areas of research include legal and taxation issues regarding agricultural producers, business and nonprofit organizations, and trusts/estates.

Prior to academia, he was Vice President and Trust Counsel for a large regional trust institution and practiced law in the areas of taxation and trusts/estates law.
