### 1. TMR-LFSP

- NDSU Purchasing advised us that we are free to negotiate directly with consultants. Lezlee and Liz have three meetings with potential contractors lined up for next week.
- If a contractor still cannot be found, MN DNR staff may be able to help NDFS staff handle the project internally.

### 2. Forest Legacy

- Liz was in Spearfish, SD last week for a Forest Legacy meeting and tour with counterparts in SD, NE, KS, CO & WY. All of these states have at least one Forest Legacy project.
  - Having an NGO partner can be important to bringing a successful project forward. They can coordinate due diligence with landowner, appraiser, lawyers, etc. They may be able to contribute financially to these preliminary activities as well.
  - A short-term easement option would require a new set of guidelines and procedures. Short-term easement projects likely would not rank out over long-term easement offers. The program is highly competitive nationwide with more offers than funds available.
  - ACEP may be an option for short-term easements.

### 3. TMR Forest Tour & Stakeholder Focus Group

- Jodi led a discussion of the surveys and focus group and will be providing a final report.
- Participants are interested in additional tours and educational opportunities. We also now have more forest landowners to reach out to for Forest Stewardship Plans and potential applicants for our aspen management cost-share program.

It feels like it can vary quickly from year to year


Limited funds for personnel to carry out projects
