The North Dakota Forest Service will hold the State Arbor Day Celebration in Bismarck on Friday, May 1, on the ND Heritage Center Plaza. The event will honor the North Dakota Parks and Recreation Department's 50th Anniversary! All current, past and retired ND Parks and Recreation employees, all state agencies, and the general public are invited to attend.

The afternoon events begin with some musical entertainment at 12:30 p.m. The program will begin at 1:00 p.m. with a welcome, and special ND Parks and Recreation 50th Anniversary Honor Guard, which will include the Arbor Day flag. After the national anthem, Governor Jack Dalrymple has been invited to read the proclamation. Remarks will follow by Director Mark Zimmerman. A ceremonial tree planting will begin at 1:30 p.m. at a designated site on the capitol grounds just south of the Heritage Center's Plaza. A Dutch elm disease resistant American elm tree will be planted. State Forester Larry Kotchman will give some remarks and a tree planting demonstration. Former Director Doug Prchal will follow with a few comments. The events conclude with more music and an "Ice Cream Social" for participants back at the Plaza. The 50th Anniversary Exhibit Trailer, located in the parking lot, will be open for free tours. In the event of inclement weather, all the events will take place inside the ND Heritage Center's Atrium.

In honor of their 50th Anniversary, the NDSU-ND Forest Service awarded the department a tree planting grant of \$10,000 to plant a diverse assortment of native trees and shrubs at eleven state parks that will enhance outdoor recreational experiences. The grant will complement ongoing tree and shrub plantings, but more importantly will assist with the replanting efforts of the flood impacted state parks, such as Fort Lincoln and the Cross Ranch State Parks. These recreational tree plantings will yield several other benefits, including bank stabilization, food and cover for birds and wildlife, screening, wind protection. conservation education experiences, beauty. The statewide and commemorative tree plantings will benefit everyone in this and future generations.

A View from the Top of the Tree

I am pleased to join my state and federal colleagues in celebrating "25 Years of Forest Legacy, Forest Stewardship, and Urban & Community Forestry Programs" in 2015. These three programs were established into law by the Food, Agriculture, Conservation, and Trade Act (1990 Farm Bill) on November 28, 1990. The North Dakota Forest Service administers the Forest Stewardship and Urban & Community Forestry Programs in our state. This anniversary provides an opportunity to celebrate not only the success of these programs, but also share the purpose and importance of these programs.

There are several efforts underway to celebrate this anniversary. These efforts include: planning a 25th Anniversary Commemorative event in Washington, D.C. in April 2015; collecting stories to highlight program successes through publications, media, and videos; and providing financial support for regional 25th anniversary endeavors.

A competitive 25th Anniversary Commemorative Assistance Fund has been established to support regional efforts in communicating the accomplishments and benefits of the programs across the country. The Washington Office will contribute up to \$15,000 for each project, which must be matched by and submitted through a U.S. Forest Service regional office.

The Forest Stewardship Program provides technical assistance, through state forestry agency partners, to private forestland owners to encourage and enable active long-term forest management. A primary focus of the program is the development of comprehensive, multi-resource management plans that provide landowners with the information they need to manage their forests for a variety of products and services.

The Urban & Community Forestry Program provides technical, financial, educational, and research services to states, cities, and nonprofit groups so they can plant, protect, maintain, and utilize wood from community trees and forests.

These programs will continue to sustain trees and forests that deliver human health, social, economic and environmental benefits.

Community Forestry Grants *By: Gerri Makay, Community Forestry Manager*

Community Forestry Grants for tree planting and program development are now available from the NDSU-North Service. Dakota Forest The application deadline is April 30, 2015.

Applicants must contact a member of the Community Forestry Program staff to discuss projects in order to be eligible for a grant award. All projects must be located on publicly owned or controlled property, including boulevards, parks or school lands. Eligible applicants include counties, townships, cities, towns, park districts, school districts and tribal equivalents. All grants require a match from the

community in the form of cash or inkind.

Planting projects should include a diversity of species, and can include a mix of shrubs and trees. Recent street tree inventories of 63 communities throughout North Dakota revealed green ash averages 46 percent of the total street tree populations. That does not prepare us well for any impending invasive pest, especially emerald ash borer.

Smaller scale planting projects are perfect for the Community Family Forest Grant, which awards up to \$2,000 for Tree City USA

communities and \$1,500 awards for all other communities. Projects must match the award 80:20, making this grant suitable for a wide range of applicants.

Under-bark Temperatures of Ash Trees in ND: Will Emerald Ash Borer Survive Here?

The under-bark temperature of ash trees was monitored by the Forest Health staff of the North Dakota Forest Service over the winter of 2014-2015 at five sites across the state. This was done to gain information about patterns of ambient temperature fluctuation and how these influence the inner temperature of trees. This information allows a better understanding of the potential temperatures experienced by overwintering insects, primarily wood boring beetles. With the potential threat of the emerald ash borer (EAB), this information could be very useful to compare to recent field studies on the cold hardiness of EAB conducted by several universities and the U.S. Forest Service. This comparison will help us determine whether EAB will be able to survive the cold North Dakota winters EAB has not been detected in North Dakota.

In December 2014, temperature sensors were installed at the following locations: Fargo, Trefoil Park; Fargo, Downtown; Bottineau; Walhalla; and Agricultural Research Mandan. Station. These areas were chosen for specific reasons. Bottineau and Walhalla were chosen because they experience the coldest temperatures in the state, and these areas contain our largest contiguous natural forest resources. Mandan was selected because it is representative of the climate in western North Dakota, and the Fargo locations were chosen to represent the climate of eastern North Dakota. The urban 'Downtown' site was of particular interest, since it provides information about urban temperatures in the environment, which can be very

different compared to temperatures in rural areas.

Temperature sensing diodes were inserted between the bark and wood of the trees using a drill. Each unit had three sensor diodes: one measured temperatures on the north and one on the south sides of the tree, and the third sensor measured the ambient air temperature approximately three feet away from the tree towards the east.

The results showed that the temperature under the bark on the southern side of trees, the side favored by overwintering insects, was often very much warmer than the ambient temperature – sometimes as much as 14 degrees warmer. The south side temperatures occasionally equaled ambient temperatures for a brief

period during the night, with the greatest temperature difference being in the afternoon on sunny days. Closer of the under-bark analysis temperatures measured this winter in North Dakota, and comparisons to published research results. unfortunately, indicates that EAB will be able to survive in North Dakota if it becomes established here. This is yet more reason to increase species diversity in tree plantings and spread the word about the threat of EAB being introduced to our state via transport of EAB-infested firewood.

Recent Changes in Fire Program Management

The ND Forest Service Fire Program and staff were recently reorganized to provide better service to our external partners and internal customers. The changes began on March 16, 2015, in the Bismarck field office.

Rvan Melin was named the Fire Manager by State Forester Larry Kotchman. Melin will be responsible for developing, implementing and directing the state-wide wildfire protection programs. In addition, he will supervise personnel aligned to fire suppression, serve as a representative to the State Forester on large fires in North Dakota and the Governor's Fire Mitigation Task Force, and be the liaison for the Western Fire Managers, Northern Rockies Interagency Fire Mobilization, the ND Fire Council and other interest groups. The goal is to increase firefighting and public safety from wildfire at all levels by



With little or no snow pack in south central and southwest North Dakota, spring fire season has arrived. The agency recently prepositioned fire resources in southwest North Dakota, and sent two engines and firefighters to assist Standing Rock Fire Management with a large fire. identifying opportunities to enhance firefighting capacity.

Anthony Schultz was selected as the Cooperative Fire Protection Manager. Schultz will be responsible for implementing developing, and directing state-wide wildfire protection programs. The position provides program oversight for the Federal Excess Personal Property, Firefighter Protection, Volunteer Fire Assistance and Cooperative Fire Protection Assistance Programs. He will coordinate between state and local jurisdictions. guiding capacity building and development of County Wildfire Protection Plans and Wildland Urban Interface (WUI) Grants.
