

## Educational Attainment of Adults in North Dakota: 2009




Figure 1. Percent of Adults Who Have Completed a Bachelor's Degree in North Dakota and the U.S.: 1960 to 2009

Approximately one in four North Dakotans ages 25 and older had completed a Bachelor's degree in 2009 (26 percent), which is up from 22 percent in 2000 and 18 percent in 1990. Nationally, 28 percent of adults had completed a Bachelor's degree in 2009 (Figure 1).

North Dakota had the 28<sup>th</sup> highest proportion in the nation of persons ages 25 and older who had completed a Bachelor's degree in 2009. West Virginia ranked lowest with 17 percent. Four states, along with the District of Columbia, had at least 35 percent of persons ages 25 and older who had completed a Bachelor's degree (Massachusetts, Colorado, Maryland, and Connecticut) (Figure 2).

Approximately 11 percent of North Dakotans ages 25 and older had less than a high school diploma in 2009, which is down from 16 percent a decade earlier. Only 10 states had a lower proportion of uneducated adults (i.e., persons ages 25 and older with less than a high school diploma).

The proportion of North Dakotans ages 25 and older who had completed some college or an Associate's degree changed little over the past decade, from 34 percent in 2000 to 35 percent in 2009 (Table 1). North Dakotans who had completed an advanced degree (i.e., Master's, Professional, Doctorate) accounted for 7 percent of all adults ages 25 and older in 2009, compared to 6 percent in 2000.

## Education Levels in North Dakota Up Slightly

Approximately one in four North Dakotans ages 25 and older had completed a Bachelor’s degree in 2009 (26 percent), which is up from 22 percent in 2000 and 18 percent in 1990. Nationally, 28 percent of adults had completed a Bachelor’s degree in 2009.

This month’s “Population Bulletin,” a monthly publication from the North Dakota State Data Center at North Dakota State University, focuses on the educational attainment of adults ages 25 and older as reported in the Census Bureau’s 2005-2009 American Community Survey.

North Dakota had the 28<sup>th</sup> highest proportion in the nation of persons ages 25 and older who had completed a Bachelor’s degree in 2009. West Virginia ranked lowest with 17 percent. Four states, along with the District of Columbia, had at least 35 percent of persons ages 25 and older who had completed a Bachelor’s degree (Massachusetts, Colorado, Maryland, and Connecticut).

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“This significant decline in North Dakota’s proportion of adults with less than a high school degree in part reflects the diminishing proportion of the state’s population who were born prior to the Great Depression. This was a time when the demand for education was less pressing,” said Richard Rathge, director of the State Data Center.
